A NOTE FROM PASTOR PAUL

October 2023

Dear Beloved Community,

Ever since I was a little kid, I have loved the Holiday of Halloween. Not only because of the loads of candy we would collect, in fact my older brother would usually trick me into giving him all my good stuff, but because of the decorations, the colors, the costumes, and the general spirit of the whole season. It would begin with the changing of the leaves from monochrome shades of green to vivid displays of reds, oranges and yellows. Our senses became alive to the beauty and bounty of the fall festival as our meals started to include favorites like pumpkin pie, hot apple cider, butternut squash, and candy corn cookies. On our way to and from school the leaves would crackle under our feet, and even the air was different. It was crisp and seemed filled with a sharp anticipation for the holiday.

Then of course there was the costume planning. My friends and family would agonize as we each tried to outdo one another in creativity and cleverness. I think our best year was when my friends and I went as the I.R.S., Internal Rascal Squad, handing out Halloween audit slips from door to door in exchange for candy. Though I never articulated it, I always thought of Halloween as a supremely Christian holiday, where family, friends, and the entire community were called upon to revel in the gifts God had given us, such as the physical gifts of food, or the spiritual gifts of creativity and beauty. I have also always thought that Halloween powerfully embodies many Christian values such as community, hope, and love.

The concept, as I understood it, was that the entire neighborhood had informally decided to spend their money and time throwing the local children a party as a sign of their love for their neighbors and hope for the future. In fact, one of the origin stories about our modern tradition of "Trick or Treat," is about a woman who was sick of kids ruining her garden every Halloween, and so she threw a party for them instead.

Because of its prehistoric roots in the celebration of the fall harvest and the preparation for winter, Halloween lends itself easily to many secular and religious interpretations. The early church knew this as they adapted the Celtic Samhain and the Roman Frelia, to become "Hallows eve" or Holy Eve and All Saints Day. These are days for celebrating life, and remembering the dead Christians who went before us.

The meaning behind Halloween goes far deeper than kids and candy, and it is far more Christian than some fanatics would have us believe. I would urge our church to cultivate this deeper meaning of Halloween.

The trend seems to be that Halloween is becoming less an event for kids in their neighborhoods, and more a celebration for all ages that takes place in public areas such as malls, town centers, and college campuses. Dare we hope that Churches and Chapel's become an open venue for this celebration as well, where the Christian spirit of the fall festival can be celebrated in all its many ways?

There are many ways we can do this. I would like to have a fall fire and party later this month, and I know the Nursery School Co-op will be having their annual Trunk or Treat in our parking lot. Also, we will be having an "All Saints Day" service on November 5th, where we will remember all the loved ones in our community that have passed away this year.

If you have any ideas, or would like to help please let me know, and together we can put the Hallowed back in Halloween!

OUTREACH

Keeping Homeless Teens Warm This Winter

You may recall that IUCC's Outreach Team hosted a presentation earlier this year from an organization called **SPIRIT NYS** which is working to help homeless students in the Rochester City Schools.

They are supplying many forms of special assistance to provide resources that will allow the students to successfully graduate from high school and beyond.

This year they are providing these services to approximately 55 students and they are asking for assistance from a few organizations to donate gently used or new winter clothing. Due to the sensitive nature of homelessness, they cannot supply us with specific names of the youth, but all adult sizes are helpful for males and females. The items should be appropriate for ages 16 - 19. Warm coats are the highest priority.

Last year, they needed sizes small through XXL, and there were more males than females. They also are accepting hats, scarves and gloves.

If they receive too many items, or things not appropriate for the youth in their program, the items will be donated to the school's clothing closet for anyone in need.

Our Outreach Team believes that this is a very worthwhile project and hope that you will consider donating one or more items. You may want to save money by looking for gently used coats at local thrift stores!

IUCC will be collecting the items October 1st through November 8th. Please put the clothing items in the labeled box which will be in our Fellowship Room.

It is once again time to think about the **Salem Nutrition Center Christmas gift bags**. This year they are asking us to collect men's deodorant. There will be a box in the front hallway for them. Once again, I (Nancy Smith) will gladly shop for you. You can leave in the office, well-marked, or just give it to me.

Our Finances at Work in the Community

During the last month IUCC has been blessed to be able to assist some wonderful organizations as they carry out important efforts to help our friends and neighbors with a variety of needs.

Using funds from the St. Paul Legacy Fund we were able to donate \$500 to Uplift Irondequoit. Their office is located in IUCC and they are Irondequoit's primary community advocate for prevention and reduction of youth substance use assisting them to grow up healthy and happy. Using funds from the Olson Fund we gave \$250 to Color Irondequoit Green which is focusing on a variety of environmental issues within Irondequoit and the surrounding area. \$500 in Olson Funds were also provided to ERASE (Eliminating Racism and Seeking Equity in Irondequoit) as they attempt to make our community a safe and inviting place for everyone.

Thank you to everyone who has helped to fund our Outreach. We still have some funds left to spend in 2023, so if you have an organization you feel would benefit from our outreach, please speak to one of the members of our committee so they will be considered.

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Halloween and my Crafty Mom

October brings to mind the fantastic creative

loving seamstress called Mom. My Mom never met a craft she couldn't do. I remember saying to my Mom that I didn't have a shirt that went with the slacks I wanted to wear to the roller skating rink one evening. She dug down into her material stash, came up with a coordinating print, and whipped up a simple sleeveless blouse for me to ware in about 30 minutes. No store-bought Halloween costumes in my house. I had the most creative cat, witch, and even Peter Peter Pumpkin Eater's Wife prize winning costume in the town's kiddy parade. She continued making creative costumes by making my daughter's costumes. I am the youngest of four, and we were each 15 months apart in age. Needless to say, my Mom had her hands full. My Dad was a good provider, however, my Mom found numerous ways to supplement his pay to pay for those little extras. She cared for children in our home, was a test kitchen for Betty Crocker, sewed ALL of the costumes for the dancing classes we took, and more. She gathered us together along with the childcare kids, and the neighborhood kids, (and there were many) to put on a play in our back yard.

Many parents that have a child with a disability want to smother the child in the name of protection. October is Blindness Awareness Month, By the way, I didn't even know the word blind until I began attending the state school for the blind in Batavia when I was in second grade. I just couldn't see as well as the rest of the kids. I know it was difficult for my Mom, but she with trepidation allowed me to stretch my wings. She covered her eyes while my Dad taught me how to ride a two wheeler bike in our yard. She allowed me to go skate at a public skating rink with my siblings, cringed when I rode the biggest roller coasters, held her breath when I dove off the side of a quarry where we swam, and pretty much worried but

allowed me to do everything the other kids did when I insisted.

You know me as someone that has no usable vision. However, I grew up having some usable vision. Mom would help us find the right lighting so I could play board games with the kids, read playing cards, and distinguish different colors for my American Brick constructions.

Mom instilled in me a desire to create useful attractive items through knitting, crocheting, plastic canvas, latch hook and more mediums. She would say something like, "Well, I don't think you could make a flower on plastic canvas, being that you can't see." She knew that would hook my determination to do it. I'd say, "Of course I can. Let's do it." And I did. When I finished, it was a red rose on that coaster I made.

I collect lighthouses, and I wanted to make a wall hanging of a lighthouse with a latch hook rug kit. She took the chart in the kit, and pains takingly translated those symbols into color abbreviations, sorted all of those little pieces of yarn, dictated the translated pattern to me so I could braille it. It is hanging on my wall still. People of my Mom's age found it hard to ask for help. However, I like to think that since she saw me ask for help when I needed it, that she was able to ask for help sometimes. I knew I made it as a cook when she called me from her work one day and asked me to make a casserole for her to take to a meeting that night. When her eye sight was decreasing, she asked me to download a baby sweater pattern and print it in large print for her, because even at 90, she was still knitting layettes for her church's new mothers.

I am blessed to have incorporated many of my amazing Mom's values and skills; cook tasty food and share it, make useful items for others, read to little kids, and love deeply.
